Change nectar & clean feeders once per week, on **Sundays**:

\*These guidelines are based on the climate in Victoria, BC, and are only meant to serve as a reminder. If you notice that the nectar is getting cloudy before the suggested change-date, do clean the feeder and refresh the nectar to ensure the hummers' good health!

## Hummingbird Nectar Recipe

- ✿ Boil 4 parts **water** with 1 part **plain white granulated table sugar\*** for 2 minutes
  - ✿ Allow the mixture to cool, then fill your feeder(s) with just enough nectar to last a few days.
  - ✿ Store leftover nectar in a clean container in the fridge for up to 10 days.
- \*This water-to-white sugar ratio is the closest to the sucrose levels they find in nature.



### IMPORTANT:

- ⊘ Never use honey, sweeteners, molasses, brown or raw sugar
- ⊘ Don't add red food colouring or other products
- ⊘ In the winter, don't alter the recipe or allow feeders to freeze\*\*

\*\*When nectar freezes, the ice displaces the sugar, so the remaining syrup has a very high sugar concentration. In the wild, hummers can tolerate slightly higher amounts of sugar, as long as they have a dietary source of water. However, in freezing conditions, water sources may not be available.

### Tips to Keep Feeders Thawed in Winter

- ⊘ Keep feeder in a protected area, covered and out of the wind
- ⊘ Have a feeder indoors to swap out when the other begins to freeze
- ⊘ Wrap non-LED holiday lights around the glass column of inverted feeders
- ⊘ Place saucer feeders on a waterproof heat mat (sold for sprouting seedlings)
- ⊘ Invest in (or build) a hummingbird feeder heater



### REMEMBER:

- ✦ Clean feeders to prevent bacterial or fungal growth - at least once a week, and every 2-3 days in the summer.
- ✦ Every time a hummer sticks its tongue in, the nectar gets inoculated with microbes, which eat the sugar.
